Due to placement, a student may graduate with more than 123 semester hours.

Note: Financial aid recipients cannot receive aid for courses repeated unnecessarily or for courses not specifically required for their degree.

Residency requirement:

A residency requirement of 31 semester hours is required to graduate from Brenau University. This includes a major residency of 21 semester hours.
